Pastor's Page

In all circumstances, give THANKS

(1 Thessalonians 5:18)

Dear Church Family and Friends,

How is your Thanksgiving Celebration? I hope you uttered words of appreciation to one another and God. According to Strong's definitions, the Hebrew word for thanksgiving is a todah from the root word yadah. It is a noun meaning confession, praise, and thanks made toward God. It is more than saying thank you. It is an act of worship.

Paul wrote to the church in Thessalonica to give thanks in all circumstances (5:18). However, how do we give thanks or worship God amidst difficulties or sorrow? How do we express our gratitude when it seems all things are failing? How do we give thanks in all circumstances? I think the answer is in the two preceding verses: Pray continually (Confession) and rejoice always (Praise).

Confession is acknowledging one's own sins against God. It is being honest, genuine, and vulnerable toward someone (toward God). For me, it is being intimate with God in all seasons, like what Paul wrote: pray continually (5:17). In any situation, we are taught to be intimate with God. To have a word with Him, to listen to God's whispers, and be in His presence. I know that being in God's presence, even if we start with complaints about life, eventually, we will end up giving thanks to the one who forgives our sins and shortcomings. We will end up giving thanks to the ONE who is always ready to listen to our confession and plea.

Praise is acknowledging and recounting the wonderful, righteous, and amazing things that God has done for us. Our hearts will be filled with joy as we think of all God has done and is doing. Paul urged the early believers to always rejoice (5:16) because he knew nothing could stop joyful people from praising and worshiping God. The joy that comes from God makes one see things in a bright light even when the world is in darkness. It is the joy of the Lord that makes one strong, even if he or she is weak. I firmly believe the joy of the Lord leads us to be thankful in all circumstances.

Like Paul, I am encouraging and challenging all of us to have confession directly to God. Let us be intimate with God as we pray without ceasing. I am inviting all to acknowledge and recount God's works for us, wherein God saved us and redeemed us from our sins. As we move into the season of Advent, in our waiting and celebration, let us give thanks in all circumstances. Yes, we can give thanks in all circumstances because we can do all things through Christ, who strengthens us and give us joy. We give thanks to the God who was born in a manger and born in our hearts.



ABOUT ADVENT

- 1. The four candles of Advent represent the four Sundays of Advent. They respectively symbolize hope, peace, joy, and love.
- 2. A tradition is that each week represents 1,000 years (representing the 4,000 years from Adam and Eve until the birth of the Savior.
- 3. Three candles are purple and one is rose. The purple candles symbolize the prayer, penance and preparatory sacrifices and good works undertaken at this time.
- 1st candle, purple, symbolizes hope and is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ.
- 2nd candle, purple, represents faith. It is called the "Bethlehem Candle" as a reminder of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

3rd candle, pink, symbolizes joy. It is called the "Shepard's Candle", and is pink because rose is a liturgical color for joy.

4th candle, purple, lit to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait for the birth of our Savior. It is called the "Angel's Candle" and symbolizes peace.

The white candle, placed in the middle, is lit on Christmas Eve. It is called the "Christ Candle" and represents the life of Christ.

One of my favorite Christmas cards has a red cardinal against the backdrop of a green holly bush with snow-tipped leaves. The bird reminds me of my summertime encounters with my feathered friends.

In the summertime, our backyard seems to be a hatchery for baby birds. We have had as many as five different birds' nests developing their young. In the days when the fledglings are leaving the nest, I become anxious. Will they be able to fly? Will they stay safe?

During those days I may notice a baby bird with a tufted head perched on a hydrangea leaf. He will flap his wings, struggle to fly, and falter on the leaves. He eventually settles down and just sits on the ground. How I wish I could help him fly and remind him that it is not safe to just sit there because the neighbor's cat is on the prowl. If only I could become a bird, I would be able to explain how best to fly and how to stay safe.

In the Advent season, I think about my desire to help those birds. For that is what Jesus did – He became one of us in order to communicate how we are to live and die. He, the Word, became flesh. He is the Incarnate. He dwelt among us and experienced what we experience. He showed us how to have a relationship with God and with others, and He showed us the way to eternal life.

During this season, I am reminded that I am like that fledgling – in danger on the ground and needing to learn. While I may struggle in this lifetime, I have access to the Creator of the universe because He humbled himself to become one of His created.

Incarnate One, thank You for becoming flesh and dwelling among us. May we recognize and learn from You. Amen.


