Nineteen-year-old Felice Scaduto was working as an elevator operator at the Schroeder Hotel in Milwaukee when musician Boudleaux Bryant stepped into her elevator. Felice recognized him immediately from a dream she's had when she was eight. In the dream, she and Boudleaux were dancing to "our song," as she later told it, and she'd been looking for him ever since. On September 5th, in 1945, just five days after they met, they married.

And so one of the great country music and pop song writing teams was born. Boudleaux memorialized their miracle meeting by penning "All I Have to Do Is Dream," one of their many songs recorded by the Everly Brothers, this one in 1958. The heartfelt tribute to the couple's love hit No. 1 on multiple *Billboard* charts simultaneously. The Bryants would go on to write more than 6,000 songs together before Boudleaux died in 1987, some 1,500 of which were recorded by artists such as Roy Orbison, Tony Bennett and Charley Pride. The couple's biggest hits include "Rocky Top," "Bye Bye Love," and "Wake Up Little Susie." They were inducted into both the Songwriters Hall of Fame and Country Music Hall of Fame. The Bryants' enduring partnership in love and music shows amazing things are possible when you follow your dreams.

Why do we decorate trees?

Decorated trees were used in winter celebrations long before the advent of Christianity. Plants and trees that remained green all year had a special significance for people who lived in cold winter climates.

Ancient people hung evergreen boughs over their doors and windows. Some believed that evergreens kept witches, ghosts, evil spirits, and illness away.

Romans decorated evergreen trees with trinkets and topped them with an image of their sun god. Druid sorcerers hung golden apples and lit candles on oak trees to celebrate the winter solstice.

Christian Christmas celebrations did indeed begin using the evergreen as a symbol about 400 years ago in Germany. This Christmas practice spread to most of northern Europe by the 19th century.

Who made the first Christmas Card?

People used to write their own cards. The first Christmas card design is thought to have been printed in England in 1843. Wood engravers of the time often produced prints with religious themes, but this was the first time anyone produced these prints in quantity and sold them (1,000 copies in London). The design was of a family party, beneath which were the words "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You." In the mid 19th century in the United States, the owner of a variety store in Albany, New York, produced a card carrying Christmas greeting from "Pease's Great Variety Store in the Temple of Fancy."

A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up that which is planted;


A time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; A time to weep, and a time to laugh;
